The lack of attention within AAVP is something of a disappointment to the recipients, but the wider attention would also be good for AAVP." A short report was included in the February 1999 issue of the AAVP Newsletter announcing winners of awards in 1998. Database Information

AAVP List Serve

Dear AAVP Members, I want to welcome you all to the AAVP email list serve. Through the efforts of Bert Stromberg we have established a list serve to provide our membership a means for rapid communication between members and with the society. Anything sent to the list serve address will automatically go out to over 300 members of AAVP. We have taken the liberty of placing into the list serve all AAVP members who have given an email address to Dan Snyder. If you do not want to receive materials from the list serve simply unsubscribe following the directions sent when you were enrolled. If you have a problem call or email Bert Stromberg, as he has graciously volunteered to run the list serve at least for a time being. Thanks from all of us Bert!!!

If you are not familiar with list serves they can be very useful. If you want to send a message to the membership, e.g. a question about a parasite for teaching, simply sending the

message to the list serve address will get it to all subscribers. A word of caution, be careful in replies, because if you reply via the list serve it also goes out to over 300 people. You can reply either by a direct reply to the list serve (over 300 recipients) or you can reply by email or phone directly to the sender. Similarly, do not use the list serve as an email to a particular person unless you want to involve many other people. Used properly the list serve can be a tremendously powerful tool for information dissemination, for open discussions, and as an educational tool. It is not good form to respond directly to the listserv message. When you simply hit the reply key for your email program, your response is sent back to the listserv and distributed to ALL members on the list. You should respond directly to the individual sending the message. Using our AAVP-LIST will be a learning process for many of us and we should begin to practice good listserv etiquette. Our goal is to be informative and not to become overwhelming with the number of messages. First Announcement: IV International Seminar in Animal Parasitology, "Control of Tick and Fly Resistance and Tickborne Diseases"

This is the first announcement of the IV International Seminar on Animal Parasitology with special reference to tick and fly resistance. The event will be held in Puerto Vallarta, Jalisco, México on October, 20-22, 1999. Organizing institutions include Sagar, Inifarvet, and Ampave.

Objectives – To analyze the current situation in field research and policies on control of tick and fly resistance to pesticides, as well as, tick borne diseases such as bovine babesiosis and

anaplasmosis; To discuss national and international policies regarding these topics in order to make recommendations for field work and research.

Introduction - The tick and fly resistance and tick borne diseases bovine babesiosis and anaplasmosis have been discussed in several meetings around the world. However, controversy remains regarding the different approaches to control these problems in different countries. For this reason it is important to update the recent advances in these fields. This is the main purpose of the IV International Seminar on Animal Parasitology. The Scientific program will cover basic and applied research. Invited plenary papers of 45 minutes will proceed the scientific workshop. Contributed papers will be allowed 10 minutes with additional 5 minutes for discussion. Experts from México, U.S.A, Australia, Germany and other countries will be invited to present plenary talks.

Instructions for Submission of Abstracts - The deadline for receipt of abstracts for contributed papers is August 30, 1999. The abstract should be constructed in accordance with Authors Instructions in Advances in Parasitology and sent to the Organizing Committee in México. The abstract should be structured to contain a brief introduction, objectives, description of the study design, a summary of results and conclusions. The abstract should not exceed 350 words, typed in lower case in single spacing. Figures, tables and references should not be included. The paper must be sent as one printed copy and a diskette 3.5" in win-word version 6.0. Final full length manuscripts that are accepted will be included in the proceedings which will be made available to registered participants.

Scientific Program – A) Actual situation of tick and fly resistance in the world. 2) Global situation, 3) Origin and evolution of resistance, 4) Socioeconomic aspects of tick and fly resistance control, 6) National programs for control resistance to pesticides in the livestock industry (México, U.S.A, Australia, Colombia, Brazil, Central America), 7) Diagnostic tests for

resistance to pesticides, 8) Present and future of the diagnostic tests for resistance, 9) Molecular biology of resistance and its application in diagnosis of resistance, 10) Bioassay and its use in surveys in ticks and flies, 11) Strategic control and integrated control management of ectoparasites, 12) Use of tick vaccines in field situations, 13) Biological control of ticks and flies, 14) New products and formulations of ixodicides.

B) Babesiosis and Anaplasmosis. 1) Perspectives on molecular biology for hemoparasite control, 2) Genetic markers associated with virulence, 3) Immunization against bovine babesiosis and anaplasmosis, 4) Field experience with *Babesia* and *Anaplasma* vaccines, 5) Epidemiology of hemoparasites.

The cost of the seminar will be \$100.00 U.S. dollars that includes proceedings and social events. Lodging and food expenses will be covered by the participants.
