## From the President

### Dear AAVP Member:

The 49<sup>th</sup> Annual Meeting of the AAVP will be held jointly with the American Society of Parasitologists from July 24 – 28, 2004 in Philadelphia, PA. Please check the AAVP ([www.aavp.org](http://www.aavp.org)) or ASP ([asp.unl.edu](http://asp.unl.edu)) web sites for additional information.

This year's program is being organized by co-Chairs Dr. Ann Donoghue (AAVP) and Dr. Don Duszynski (ASP). Information about the program and instructions for abstract submission are presented elsewhere in the newsletter. Please note that the deadline for abstracts is March 19, 2004, which is several weeks earlier than in recent years. Ann and Don are developing a great program that will feature concurrent oral sessions and scientific symposia each day, a poster session, and numerous social functions. You are all encouraged to attend the Presidents' Symposium on July 25 to learn from international experts about the "Global Impact of Parasitism on Child Health and Development – A Medical and Veterinary Concern."

Students are the future of our organization, and their attendance at this year's meeting is strongly encouraged. To facilitate student participation, travel grants are again available, and Dr. Ellis Greiner's Awards Committee will organize a student paper competition. In addition, AAVP attendees have been invited to participate in ASP's 17<sup>th</sup> Annual Student Auction. Details of these items are presented herein.

The Nominations Committee (Chair, Dr. Joan Lunney) has assembled an excellent slate of candidates for Vice President and Nominating Committee. Biographical sketches of the candidates are provided in this newsletter (pages

14-21). A pre-addressed, pre-stamped postcard ballot will be mailed to the membership in mid-February. Please be sure to vote!

The membership of the AAVP (academia, industry, government, practice) represents almost as much variety as the organisms we study. But this year, the level of diversity at our annual meeting will expand by an order of magnitude due to the ASP presence. Not being a member of ASP, I am uncertain as to what distinguishes one society from the other. Is ASP more basic and AAVP more applied? Does ASP embrace the general phenomenon of parasitism, whereas AAVP focuses on pathogens of domestic animals? I'm not sure but I suspect that, like anthelmintics in a feed store, the individual members share more similarities than differences. The commingling of any two groups, whether of similar or diverse backgrounds, creates unlimited opportunities for

### **Awards**

#### **AAVP Member Receives High Nigerian National Award**



President, Commander-in Chief of the Armed Forces of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, His Excellency, Chief Oulsegun Obasanjo, GFCR, congratulating Chief Sir Professor Alex D. W. Acholonu (OON) upon being conferred with the National Honors Award, Officer of the Order of the Niger (OON).

On December 16<sup>th</sup>, 2003, Dr. Alex Acholonu, Professor of Biology and President of the Alcorn State University Faculty Senate, received a high national award from the President of Nigeria at the International Conference Center (ICC) Abuja, the Federal Capital Territory of Nigeria. The award was given in recognition of his remarkable and meritorious contributions to the growth and development of university

scholarship both nationally and internationally, particularly in the Biological Sciences, and his exemplary leadership qualities. Dr. Acholonu was cited as an accomplished University Professor of Biological Sciences, an erudite scholar, and a philanthropist *par excellence* and was honored with the award of the Officer of the Order of the Niger (OON). For being a recipient of this award his name was published in the Nigerian Federal Government Gazette. In addition to this, he received a letter of award, a medal, and a certificate signed by the President of the Federal Republic of Nigeria. This award goes with the privilege of putting the initials OON after his name with effect from the date of conferment of the award.

### **Position Announcement**

#### **Wendell H. and Nellie G. Krull Endowed Professorship in Veterinary Parasitology**

The College of Veterinary Medicine, Oklahoma State University requests applications and nominations for the Wendell H. and Nellie G. Krull Endowed Professorship in Veterinary Parasitology. Dr. Wendell H. Krull, a pioneer in veterinary parasitology, had a passion for teaching veterinary and graduate students and for research. The person filling this professorship should share Dr. Krull's enthusiasm for parasitology teaching and research. His enthusiasm for veterinary parasitology inspired many students to excellence in the practice of clinical parasitology and to the pursuit of academic careers in veterinary parasitology. His wife, Nellie G. Krull, was integral to the high achievements of her husband and to the establishment of this professorship. This Professorship carries an endowment of \$560,000 for the continuation and development of the Professor's research and post-DVM training programs. The appointee should have demonstrated competence in teaching veterinary parasitology to professional and graduate students; professional consultative experience in veterinary clinical parasitology; and a sustained research program. The particular research area is open to the interest and expertise of the candidate. The

appointee will be responsible for 1) shared teaching of parasitology to students in the professional curriculum; 2) developing and maintaining a research program in parasitic diseases funded by NIH, USDA, NSF or other federal agencies; 3) training graduate students, veterinarians, and postdoctoral fellows in parasitology; 4) consultative participation in veterinary clinical parasitology; 5) maintaining a distinguished record of scientific publication and leadership in the candidate's scientific discipline; and 6) establishment of collaborative teaching and research efforts with other College faculty. Qualifications for the Professorship include an earned DVM or equivalent degree; PhD degree in an appropriate discipline; experience or postgraduate training in veterinary clinical parasitology; demonstration of excellence in teaching in professional and graduate studies curricula; a proven record of research scholarship and history of sustained funding support; and academic accomplishments to support appointment at the rank of associate or full professor. Nominations and applications by interested applicants should include a CV, a description of the research program and plans for further program development, and the names and addresses of five references should be sent to Dr. Carl Fox, Professor and Chair, Search Committee for the Wendell H. and Nellie G. Krull Endowed Professorship in Veterinary Parasitology, Department of Veterinary Pathobiology, College of Veterinary Medicine, Oklahoma State University, Stillwater, OK 74078. Review of applications will begin March 1, 2004 and will continue until a suitable candidate is identified. Since this is a human health webpage it will mainly be of interest for those lectures on zoonotic parasites. The life cycle figures are amazing and we all know how hard it is to find good figures for our courses.

The site by the Merial group in Australia has some really well-designed webpages on small [[http://au.merial.com/pet\\_owners.asp](http://au.merial.com/pet_owners.asp)] and large [<http://au.merial.com/producers.asp>] animal parasites. The topics are arranged by animal species and in the pull-down menu you choose "disease information," which only deals with parasitic infections. Each parasite species has a general introduction and then a discussion. Although largely restricted to helminthes and ectoparasites, the site contains good quality pictures of both the parasites and the pathology of parasitic diseases.

### Nominations for AAVP Awards Solicited

The AAVP Awards Committee is responsible for soliciting nominations for the 2004 awards. The title and a brief description of each of the AAVP awards are provided below. Guidelines and instructions for nominations are outlined later in this newsletter. The Awards Committee will also administer the Travel Grant and the Student Presentation Competition. Members of the AAVP are encouraged to nominate a fellow colleague or a student for one of our society's awards. All nominations/applications and supporting documents should reach the Chair of the Awards Committee by **30 April 2004**. Nominations received after this date will not be considered. The recipients of some awards will be announced prior to the meeting, and all awards will be presented at the annual meeting in Philadelphia.

The **AAVP Distinguished Veterinary Parasitologist Award** is the society's most prestigious award. This is where we recognize outstanding contributions of an AAVP member to the advancement of veterinary parasitology. The names of past recipients in this category were listed in last year's program proceedings, and it is an impressive list.

The **AAVP Distinguished Service Award** is given to recognize long terms of extraordinary service and commitment to the society. When given (not annually) the award includes a plaque and travel expenses to attend the annual meeting.

The **AAVP-Intervet Graduate Student Award** is provided to honor a graduate student or a recent graduate for outstanding performance in graduate study in veterinary parasitology. The

award consists of reimbursement of travel expenses, a plaque, and an honorarium. Many past recipients are now active AAVP members and contribute greatly to the success of our society. Last year's recipient was Dr. Mary Rossano, who earned her PhD from Michigan State University.

**The AAVP Young Investigator Travel Grant** is a competitive grant awarded to full-time DVM or undergraduate/graduate students enrolled in an accredited institution of higher learning and pursuing studies in veterinary parasitology. Deserving Post-docs who are within 5 years of their degree are also eligible for this award. Supporting documents, commitment of additional or matching funds from a sponsoring AAVP member, and submission of an abstract are needed for this award. Students applying for the travel grant are also eligible to compete for the Student Presentation Awards. Last year, 11 students were supported to attend the annual meeting.

**The AAVP Best Student Paper Presentation Awards** are given to two undergraduate/graduate students who compete successfully in the Student Presentation competition. All students who submit applications for the AAVP Young Investigator Travel Grant will be scheduled for the competition, unless there is a specific request to be excluded. Students who do not apply for the Young Investigator Travel Grant, but wish to compete for the Best Student Presentation Awards, should complete and submit the Verification of Student Status form. Judges at the meeting will use the checklist included in this newsletter to help rate the presentations. The awards include cash prizes. *Submitted by Ellis C. Electronic presentations are encouraged; bring your presentation on CD, Zip, USB flash drive or 3.5” floppy.

Student travel grants will be available again this year and there will also be a student paper competition. ### Guidelines for AAVP Awards

#### Distinguished Veterinary Parasitologist Award

**Origin** - This award was established to recognize outstanding contribution of an AAVP member to the advancement of Veterinary Parasitology.

**Criteria for Nomination** - This is an award that honors contributions to veterinary parasitology that are widely recognized internationally as significant and important to the understanding and control of parasitic diseases of animals.

**Procedure for Nomination** - Solicitation of nominations for the award will be announced annually in the AAVP Newsletter. Any member of the AAVP may nominate a candidate by forwarding a letter of nomination describing the candidate's worthiness for the award and a copy of their CV to the Chair of the Awards Committee. The nominator should arrange for **3** letters to be written in support of the nomination by members of the AAVP and sent to the Chair of the Awards Committee. Only 3 letters of support plus the letter of nomination will be considered by the Awards Committee. To expedite the process and to ensure that all of the letters of support arrive prior to the 30 April 2004 deadline, it is recommended that the nominator assemble the entire package of information in support of the nominee, including the **3** letters, and send everything in one mailing to the Chair of the Awards Committee.

**Selection** - All documents provided in nomination of the candidate will be forwarded to all members of the Awards Committee. The selection of a recipient will be made by written ballot based on evidence of the nominee's contribution to the advancement of veterinary parasitology.

**The Award** - The recipient will be honored at the annual meeting of the AAVP and will receive a plaque and a \$1500 monetary award provided by Merial. The AAVP will provide reimbursement of expenses necessary for the recipient to attend the Association's annual meeting.

### **Distinguished Service Award**

**Origin** - This award was established to recognize long terms of clearly extraordinary service and commitment to the AAVP.

#### **Criteria for Nomination** -

1. The nominee shall be a member in good standing of the AAVP.
2. Nomination of candidates for whom service to the AAVP is conducted normally or routinely, such as those involved in holding an office in the Association, will not be accepted.

**Procedure for Nomination** - Solicitation of nominations for the award will be announced annually in the AAVP Newsletter. Any member of the AAVP may nominate a member by forwarding a letter of nomination to the Chair of the Awards Committee describing the candidate's service to the Association. The nominator should arrange for 3 letters to be written in support of the nomination by members of the AAVP and sent to the Chair of the Awards Committee by 30 April 2004..

**Selection** - All documents provided in nomination of the candidate will be forwarded to all members of the Awards Committee. The selection of a recipient will be made by written ballot based on evidence of the nominee's level of service and long-term commitment to the AAVP.

**The Award** - The award consists of an engraved plaque specifically recognizing the awardee for their extraordinary service to the AAVP. The AAVP will provide reimbursement of expenses necessary for the recipient to attend the Society's annual meeting.

### **AAVP-Intervet Graduate Student Award**

**Origin** - The award is intended to provide recognition of outstanding performance in graduate study in veterinary parasitology.

#### **Criteria for Nomination** -

1. Nominations are limited to graduate students enrolled in or those who have completed their M.S. or Ph.D. degree within the previous 12 months.
2. The award is made based only on research carried out during a student's graduate (M.S. or Ph.D.) program.
3. Preference will be given to nominees that are enrolled in or have received their degree from a North American Institute at the time the award is given; however, students from universities outside of North America are eligible for nomination and receipt of this award.
4. The student's graduate program **must be** in veterinary parasitology.

**Procedure for Nomination** - Solicitation of nominations for the award will be announced annually in the AAVP Newsletter. Any member of the AAVP may nominate a student by forwarding a letter of nomination to the Chair of the Awards Committee.

1. A letter of nomination from an AAVP member in good standing describing the candidate's excellence in graduate studies and research.
2. A copy of the student's curriculum vitae.
3. Reprints of pertinent publications as a result of the student's graduate research.
4. Arrange for 3 letters to be written in support of the nomination by members of the AAVP.
5. Only 3 letters of support in addition to the letter of nomination will be considered by the Awards Committee.

Please Note: In the case where the nominator is not the candidate's graduate supervisor, one of the letters of support must be obtained from the candidate's graduate supervisor. To expedite the process and to ensure that all of the letters of support arrive prior to the 30 April 2004 deadline, it is recommended that the nominator assemble the entire packet of information in support of the nominee, including the **3** letters, and send everything in one mailing to the Chair of the Awards Committee.

**Selection** - All documents provided in nomination of each candidate will be forwarded to all members of the Awards Committee. Preference will be given to graduate students from North American institutes; however, students from universities outside of North America are eligible for nomination and receipt of this award. The selection of a recipient will be made by written ballot based on evidence of excellence in graduate course work, graduate research, and graduate research publications.

**The Award** - The award consists of reimbursement by the AAVP of expenses necessary for the recipient to attend the annual meeting of the AAVP, an engraved plaque, and a monetary award of \$1000 provided by Intervet.

### **AAVP Young Investigator Travel Grant**

#### **Instructions for application**

1. Applicant must be a full-time graduate/undergraduate/DVM student enrolled in an accredited institution of higher learning or a Post-doc who is within 5 years of their terminal degree (MD, PhD, or DVM).
2. Only a student/Post-Doc presenting a paper (abstract) at the annual meeting of the American Association of Veterinary Parasitologists (AAVP) is eligible to apply for a Young Investigator Travel Grant (YITG).

5. A YITG will be awarded only when funds equal to the amount requested from the AAVP are available from another source(s) for support of applicant's travel. The source(s) of matching funds and the signature of the person authorized to commit funds are required on the YITG application.
6. The total amount of YITG funds requested by an applicant in a single year will be matched by the AAVP up to a maximum of and may not exceed \$500.00.
7. An estimate of the total cost of travel to and from the AAVP meeting must be provided on the YITG application.
8. The total number of YITGs to be awarded each year will depend on the availability of funds, number of applicants, and location of the meeting.
9. The completed application form with all necessary signatures, the one page letter of support from the AAVP member sponsoring the student/Post-doc, and a copy of the abstract to be presented at the meeting must be sent to the Chair of the Awards Committee.
10. Selection of awardees from applicants fulfilling all of the above-mentioned requirements will be judged primarily on two criteria: (1) the written and apparent scientific quality of the abstract; and (2) the one-page supporting letter explaining and documenting the significance of the research to be reported by the student/Post-doc and indicating why the student/Post-doc is deserving of this award.

The objectives of the AAVP and its requirements for membership (Articles II and III of the AAVP Constitution) are:

**Objectives:** "The objectives of the organization shall be to provide for the association of persons interested in the advancement of veterinary parasitology, and for the presentation and discussion of items of common interest, and to further scientific progress by education and research in veterinary parasitology. This association is organized exclusively for scientific and educational purposes within the meaning of section 501(C)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Notwithstanding any other provision of this constitution, the Association shall not carry out any other activities not permitted to be carried out by an organization exempt from Federal Income Tax under section 501(C)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code."

**Membership:** "Section 1: Members shall consist of those individuals qualified by background, education and interest in veterinary parasitology. Section 2: New members, except honorary and emeritus, shall be admitted by the Secretary-Treasurer with approval of the Executive Committee, after filing application for membership to the association. Section 3: Honorary membership shall be awarded by the Association to persons who are not members of the Association in recognition of outstanding and sustained achievements in veterinary parasitology. Candidates for honorary membership shall be recommended to the awards committee by any member. Nomination for honorary membership shall be made by the Awards Committee to the membership and election shall be majority vote at the annual meeting. Honorary members shall not be eligible to vote and shall not be assessed dues. No more than two (2) honorary members shall be elected in any one-year period. Section 4: Upon retirement a member may become an emeritus member on approval of the Executive Committee of a written request to the Secretary-Treasurer for such status. Emeritus members shall retain voting rights but shall not be assessed dues. Section 5: Forfeiture of membership will occur where dues are not paid for at least two consecutive years. A member who has forfeited membership by nonpayment of dues must reapply for membership. Section 6: Expulsion of a member may occur if a motion for expulsion is presented by the Executive Committee at the annual meeting and passed by four-fifths (4/5) of the members present and voting. The member is to be informed in writing of such a motion at least two months in advance of the annual meeting at which the motion is to be presented. Section 7: The Executive Committee may annually invite any firm, association, corporation, institution or subdivision thereof, to become a corporate associate member, for financial support of the Association."
