From the President

As promised in October's AAVP newsletter issue, your Executive Officers held a Mid-Year Executive Officers AAVP meeting in Kansas City, MO to begin the process of refocusing AAVP's efforts in the greater parasitology and scientific communities to meet new challenges. In the last decade we have adapted to the need for constant change as an integral part of life as practicing scientists, teachers, practitioners of veterinary medicine, producers of new pharmaceuticals and proponents of the public health. However, in the near future we agree that there are new and formidable challenges that AAVP must meet to grow and flourish. The results of this 2 day intensive brainstorming session was the AAVP Future Planning document to be shared with the membership at the annual meeting in Minneapolis. It identifies strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats to AAVP and beginning steps to address these issues with concrete action plans. Along with these actions plans, we developed a draft vision statement for AAVP. Here I share our vision and an overview of conclusions reached by the Executive Committee toward future change in AAVP.

Vision 2005: The AAVP solves problems in veterinary parasitology facing our veterinary and healthcare institutions in the US and throughout the world to enhance the health and well being of humans and animals. We train the next generation of scientists as

experts in veterinary parasitology and provide science-based policy without bias to agencies and stakeholders around the world.

As we identify participants for implementation and future planning, I invite you to share your own insights. I want to know what challenges you face and what possible solutions you see to these issues. How can we (AAVP) help you, and how can you help AAVP to carry us forward into the future to maintain and grow our abilities and influence. I challenge you to join us in further shaping and implementing our action plans. See you in Minneapolis!

Along with a copy of the Proceedings book, all AAVP members will receive a copy of the book "A History of the American Association of Veterinary Parasitologists (1956-2005)" by Dr. Raffaele A. Roncalli. The book, sponsored by Pfizer, covers the history of AAVP up through the 50th anniversary meeting with sections on men and women parasitologists and early advertisements of parasiticide products.

Oklahoma State University

The Oklahoma State University Center for Veterinary Health Sciences (CVHS) requests applications for the tenure-track position of Assistant/Associate Professor of Veterinary

Parasitology. The position will be 60 percent research, 40 percent teaching, with a 9- or 11-month appointment in the College of Veterinary Medicine. The faculty member will be responsible for teaching introductory parasitology (one 3-credit course in the spring semester) in the professional curriculum, developing and teaching one or more graduate course(s) in parasitology, and will be expected to establish an extramurally funded research program involving the training of graduate students. The starting date for this position is anticipated to be October 1, 2005.

Candidates should have earned a PhD in parasitology or medical entomology with a DVM/PhD being desired. Candidates should have a documented history of teaching. Candidates should also have a record of research accomplishments indicating a potential for future research success or demonstrating sustained funding support, depending on professorial rank of the initial appointment. The particular area of research emphasis is open to the interest of the candidate. Salary will be commensurate with the candidate's qualifications and experience.

The OSU College of Veterinary Medicine has a proven history of commitment to parasitology teaching and a nationally recognized program in infectious and tick-borne disease research with a strong graduate program. There is a growing emphasis on biomedical research at OSU and the CVHS has collaborations with the new Oklahoma Technology and Research Park in Stillwater.

Oklahoma State University is a land-grant institution founded in 1890. Stillwater is located in north-central Oklahoma, approximately 80 miles from Tulsa and Oklahoma City, with 40,000 residents and a low cost of living. Cats and pregnancy

The Humane Society of the United States (HSUS) (www.petsforlife.org) distributed copies of the CDC/AAVP guidelines for dog and cat owners on the prevention of roundworms and hookworms at the Pediatric Academic Societies' (American Pediatric Society, Society for Pediatric Research, Ambulatory Pediatric Association, American Academy of Pediatrics) Annual Meeting in Washington, DC, on May 14-17, 2005. HSUS has initiated a Pets for Life program to keep pets and their people together. According to HSUS, many pregnant women report giving up their cats based on misinformation about the risks of acquiring toxoplasmosis from household cats. The objectives of the AAVP and its requirements for membership (Articles II and III of the AAVP Constitution) are:

Objectives: "The objectives of the organization shall be to provide for the association of persons interested in the advancement of veterinary parasitology, and for the presentation and discussion of items of common interest, and to further scientific progress by education and research in veterinary parasitology. This association is organized exclusively for scientific and educational purposes within the meaning of section 501(C)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Notwithstanding any other provision of this constitution, the Association shall not carry out any other activities not permitted to be carried out by an organization exempt from Federal Income Tax under section 501(C)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code."

Membership: "Section 1: Members shall consist of those individuals qualified by background, education and interest in veterinary parasitology. Section 2: New members, except honorary and emeritus, shall be admitted by the Secretary-Treasurer with approval of the Executive Committee, after filing application for membership to the association. Section 3: Honorary membership shall be awarded by the Association to persons who are not members of the Association in recognition of outstanding and sustained achievements in veterinary parasitology. Candidates for honorary membership shall be recommended to the awards committee by any member. Nomination for honorary membership shall be made by the Awards Committee to the membership and election shall be majority vote at the annual meeting. Honorary members shall not be eligible to vote and shall not be assessed dues. No more than two (2) honorary members shall be elected in any one year period. Section 4: Upon retirement a member may become an emeritus member on approval of the Executive Committee of a written request to the Secretary-Treasurer for such status. Emeritus members shall retain voting rights but shall not be assessed dues. Section 5: Forfeiture of membership will occur where dues are not paid for at least two consecutive years. A member who has forfeited membership by nonpayment of dues must reapply for membership. Section 6: Expulsion of a member may occur if a motion for expulsion is presented by the Executive Committee at the annual meeting and passed by four-fifths (4/5) of the members present and voting. The member is to be informed in writing of such a motion at least two months in advance of the annual meeting at which the motion is to be presented. Section 7: The Executive Committee may annually invite any firm, association, corporation, institution or subdivision thereof, to become a corporate associate member, for financial support of the Association."
