From the President

Hawai'i!! The first time the AVMA has met in the 50th state (after 142 years). It's not all that easy or convenient to get there, flights are long; the time change from the eastern time zone is 6 hours. Even so, what a beautiful, wondrous place for a meeting of parasitologists!

The unique habitats of islands isolated by miles of water have been grand learning experiences for biologists, botanists, ecologists and yes, parasitologists. The isolation provides for unique experiments in evolution. Hawai'i's flora and fauna, like New Zealand's, evolved without terrestrial mammals. The ecological niches usually occupied by mammals were filled primarily by birds. The World Association for the Advancement of Veterinary Parasitology (WAAVP) met last October in New Zealand. And here we are in Hawai'i. For the AAVP/AVMA President's Symposium, we will take advantage of the evolutionary opportunities isolation provides with speakers discussing how parasites have, for good and bad, affected the biocomplexity of their environment and hosts. This year, AVMA has given AAVP two options to reserve hotel rooms through the AVMA Housing Bureau.

1. AAVP members can call the AVMA Housing Bureau at 800-424-5249 (US residents only) or +1-847-940-2155. Be sure to ask for the AAVP rooms at the Sheraton Waikiki and inform the agent that you are with the subgroup AAVP. You do not have to register for AVMA to secure a room. If you

have difficulty with the agent on the line, ask to be transferred to Nancy (Ext. 6752) or Rocio (Ext. 6754). They will be glad to help you.

2. As in the past, AAVP members can complete the AVMA Housing Form and fax to 800-521-6017 (US residents only) or +1-847-940-2386. For your convenience, the AVMA housing form was previously emailed to the AAVP Listserve and was included in the February mailing. It will also appear on the AAVP website. .

Try to confirm your room reservation as early as possible to ensure that you get into this hotel. AVMA recommends that we now submit our lodging forms no later than **March 15**, so don't delay. Due to the great interest in Hawaii, AVMA wishes for AAVP to release our remaining rooms after this date. All meeting-related information will be posted on the AAVP website (www.aavp.org) by the end of February and will be included in the February mailing along with the AAVP meeting registration form and election ballot. The AAVP Distinguished Veterinary Parasitologist Award

This is the society's most prestigious award. This is where we honor the outstanding contributions of an AAVP member to the advancement of veterinary parasitology. The names of past recipients in this category were listed in last year's program proceedings, and it is an impressive list.

The AAVP Distinguished Service Award

The AAVP Distinguished Service Award is given to recognize long terms of extraordinary service and commitment to the society. When given (not annually) the award includes a plaque and travel expenses to attend the annual meeting.

The AAVP-Intervet Graduate Student Award

This award is provided to honor a graduate student or a recent graduate for outstanding performance in graduate study in veterinary parasitology. The recipient will get center stage at the annual meeting and be given 30 minutes to present the highlights of his/ her research. The award consists of reimbursement of travel expenses, a plaque, and an honorarium. Many past recipients are now active AAVP members and contribute greatly to the success of our society.

The AAVP Young Investigator Travel Grant

The travel grants are a competitive grant awarded to full-time DVM or undergraduate / graduate students enrolled in an accredited institution of higher learning and pursuing studies in veterinary parasitology. Deserving post-docs who are within 5 years of their degree are also eligible for this award. Supporting documents, commitment of additional or matching funds from a sponsoring AAVP member, and submission of an abstract are needed for this award. Students applying for the travel grant are also eligible to compete for the Student Presentation Awards.

The AAVP Best Student Paper Presentation Awards

The awards are given to two undergraduate/graduate students who compete successfully in the Student Presentation competition. All students who submit applications for the AAVP Young Investigator Travel Grant will be entered into the competition, unless there is a specific request to be excluded. Students who do not apply for the Young Investigator Travel Grant, but wish to compete for the Best Student Presentation Awards, should complete and submit the Verification of Student Status form. Judges at the meeting will use the checklist included in this newsletter to help rate the presentations. The awards include cash prizes.

The Program and Abstracts booklet and name badges will be available at the onsite registration table upon arrival. Proceedings books will not be mailed prior to the meeting even if you pre-register. Those AAVP members who do not attend the meeting will have their copy of the Proceedings book mailed to them after the meeting. The program chair will notify (via email) the designated author of each abstract to confirm when your abstract (day/time) is to be presented. Also, check the AAVP website for updates on the Program and meeting schedule.

Audiovisual capabilities

Electronic presentations must be used. There will be **no** Kodachrome slides (2 X 2) or overhead projectors available for use. All electronic files must be downloaded to the computer prior to the start of your session. Sessions may include up to 8 papers, so please plan to arrive early.

AAVP will provide computer equipment in each meeting room, so there is no need to bring a personal laptop. Current computer configurations for rented equipment are the following: Pentium III, 933 MHz, 256 RAM, 20 GB hard disk, Ethernet card, CD ROM Player, DVD Player, 3.5" floppy drive, 250 MB ZIP drive, Windows 98, Office 2000. Modems are not standard. Media that can be used are CD, 3.5" floppy, ZIP disk or memory stick/USB JumpDrive.

MS PowerPoint® is currently the only software supported for electronic presentations. If any authors wish to use other programs, we'll need to check with the AV vendor to determine availability and compatibility. Mac users: save your PowerPoint files so they can be run on a Windows based computer and PowerPoint program.

Presentation format

Each speaker has a 15-minute time slot. It is recommended that you plan your oral presentation to be delivered over 12 to 13 minutes to allow time for questions at the end of your talk.

Abstract format

All typing should be fully justified, single spaced, 12 pt Arial and left and right margins set at 1.25 inch. The title should be bolded and in lower case, the authors' names and affiliation should be capitalized not bolded.

The title and the abstract content are both important components.

The TITLE should be short, concise and indicative of the content of the abstract.

The AUTHORS' NAMES (initials plus family name) and AFFILIATIONS (institute, city, state/country) follow the title. Use an asterisk (*) after the name of the person who will present the paper and superscript the author's affiliation if more than one institution is involved.

Insert an open space between the institutions and the body of the abstract.

The CONTENT of the abstract should be a single paragraph without tables that starts 1 line after the title without indentation and which contains a concise statement of: 1) the problem under investigation, 2) the experimental methods used, 3) the essential results obtained, and 4) the major conclusions. The text should cite quantitative data from representative experiments or summary data. Do not state: "the results will be discussed." Italicize all scientific names.

Abstracts should not contain tables etc., and should not exceed 300 words (not including title or authors names and institutions).

Example 1:

Serologic detection of *Angiostrongylus vasorum* infection in dogs. I. VERZBERGER*, J. SHEPPARD, G. CONBOY. ATLANTIC VETERINARY COLLEGE, UNIVERSITY OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND, CHARLOTTETOWN, PE CANADA.

Angiostrongylus vasorum, French Heartworm, is a metastrongylid parasite causing potentially fatal cardiovascular disease in dogs and wild canids in various regions of the world. In North America, there is a single endemic foci in the eastern part of the Avalon Peninsula in Newfoundland, Canada.

Example 2:

Experimental *Cystoisospora canis* (syn. *Isospora canis*) infections in beagles and mice. S.M. MITCHELL^{1*}, S. CHARLES².

Canine coccidiosis caused by *Cystoisospora canis* or members of the *C. ohioensis* complex can be a serious intestinal disease in young dogs. Much of the parasitology literature indicates that experimentally infected dogs are resistant to clinical coccidiosis.

AAVP AWARDS Guidelines and Application Forms

Distinguished Veterinary Parasitologist Award

Criteria for Nomination - This is an award that honors contributions to veterinary parasitology that are widely recognized internationally as significant and important to the understanding and control of parasitic diseases of animals.

Procedure for Nomination - Solicitation of nominations for the award will be announced annually in the AAVP Newsletter. Any member of the AAVP may nominate a candidate by forwarding a letter of nomination describing the candidate's worthiness for the award and a copy of their CV to the Chair of the Awards Committee. The nominator should arrange for 3 letters to be written in support of the nomination by members of the AAVP and sent to the Chair of the Awards Committee. Only 3 letters of support plus the letter of nomination will be considered by the Awards Committee. To expedite the process and to ensure that all of the letters of support arrive prior to the **1 May 2006** deadline, it is recommended that the nominator assemble the entire package of information in support of the nominee, including the 3 letters, and send everything in one mailing to the Chair of the Awards Committee.

Selection - All documents provided in nomination of the candidate will be forwarded to all members of the Awards Committee. The selection of a recipient will be made by written ballot based on evidence of the nominee's contribution to the advancement of veterinary parasitology.

The Award - The recipient will be honored at the annual meeting of the AAVP and will receive a plaque and a \$1500 monetary award provided by Merial. The AAVP will provide reimbursement of expenses necessary for the recipient to attend the Association's annual meeting.

Distinguished Service Award

Criteria for Nomination -

1. The nominee shall be a member in good standing of the AAVP.
2. Nomination of candidates for whom service to the AAVP is conducted normally or routinely, such as those involved in holding an office in the Association, will not be accepted.

Procedure for Nomination - Solicitation of nominations for the award will be announced annually in the AAVP Newsletter. Any member of the AAVP may nominate a member by forwarding a letter of nomination to the Chair of the Awards Committee describing the candidate's service to the Association. The nominator should arrange for 3 letters to be written in support of the nomination by members of the AAVP and sent to the Chair of the Awards Committee by **1 May 2006**.

Selection - All documents provided in nomination of the candidate will be forwarded to all members of the Awards Committee. The selection of a recipient will be made by written ballot based on evidence of the nominee's level of service and long-term commitment to the AAVP.

The Award - The award consists of an engraved plaque specifically recognizing the awardee for their extraordinary service to the AAVP. The AAVP will provide reimbursement of expenses necessary for the recipient to attend the Society's annual meeting.

AAVP-Intervet Graduate Student Award

Criteria for Nomination -

1. Nominations are limited to graduate students enrolled in or those who have completed their MS or PhD degree within the previous 12 months.
2. The award is made based only on research carried out during a student's graduate (MS or PhD) program.
3. Preference will be given to nominees that are enrolled in or have received their degree from a North American institute at the time the award is given; however, students from universities outside of North America are eligible for nomination and receipt of this award.
4. The student's graduate program **must be** in veterinary parasitology.

Procedure for Nomination - Solicitation of nominations for the award will be announced annually in the AAVP Newsletter. Any member of the AAVP may nominate a student by forwarding a letter of nomination to the Chair of the Awards Committee.

1. A letter of nomination from an AAVP member in good standing describing the candidate's excellence in graduate studies and research.
2. A copy of the student's *curriculum vitae*.
3. Reprints of pertinent publications as a result of the student's graduate research.
4. Arrange for 3 letters to be written in support of the nomination by members of the AAVP.

Only 3 letters of support in addition to the letter of nomination will be considered by the Awards Committee. In the case where the nominator is not the candidate's graduate supervisor, one of the letters of support must be obtained from the candidate's graduate supervisor. To expedite the process and to ensure that all of the letters of support arrive prior to the **1 May 2006** deadline, it is recommended that the nominator assemble the entire packet of information in support of the nominee, including the 3 letters, and send everything in one mailing to the Chair of the Awards Committee.

Selection - All documents provided in nomination of each candidate will be forwarded to all members of the Awards Committee. Preference will be given to graduate students from North American institutes; however, students from universities outside of North America are eligible for nomination and receipt of this award. The selection of a recipient will be made by written ballot based on evidence of excellence in graduate course work, graduate research, and graduate research publications.

The Award - The award consists of reimbursement by the AAVP of expenses necessary for the recipient to attend the annual meeting of the AAVP, an engraved plaque, and a monetary award of \$1000 provided by Intervet.

AAVP Young Investigator Travel Grant

1. Applicant must be a full-time graduate/undergraduate/DVM student enrolled in an accredited institution of higher learning or a post-doc who is within 5 years of their terminal degree (MD, PhD, or DVM).
2. Only a student/post-doc presenting a paper (abstract) at the annual meeting of the American Association of Veterinary Parasitologists (AAVP) is eligible.
3. Funds must be applied to travel to the AAVP meeting held during the year of application.
4. The applicant must be sponsored by an active, full member of the AAVP. The sponsor's signature is required on the application.
5. A YITG will be awarded only when funds equal to the amount requested from the AAVP are available from another source(s) for support of applicant's travel. The source(s) of matching funds and the signature of the person authorized to commit funds are required.
6. The total amount of funds requested by an applicant in a single year will be matched by the AAVP up to a maximum of \$500.00.
7. An estimate of the total cost of travel to and from the AAVP meeting must be provided.
8. The total number of awards each year will depend on the availability of funds, number of applicants, and location of the meeting.
9. The completed application form with all necessary signatures, the one page letter of support from the AAVP member sponsoring the student/post-doc, and a copy of the abstract to be presented at the meeting must be sent to the Chair of the Awards Committee.
10. Selection of awardees from applicants fulfilling all of the above-mentioned requirements will be judged primarily on two criteria: (1) the written and apparent scientific quality of the abstract; and (2) the one-page supporting letter explaining and documenting the significance of the research to be reported by the student/Post-doc and indicating why the student/post-doc is deserving of this award.

The objectives of the AAVP and its requirements for membership (Articles II and III of the AAVP Constitution) are:

Objectives: "The objectives of the organization shall be to provide for the association of persons interested in the advancement of veterinary parasitology, and for the presentation and discussion of items of common interest, and to further scientific progress by education and research in veterinary parasitology. This association is organized exclusively for scientific and educational purposes within the meaning of section 501(C)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Notwithstanding any other provision of this constitution, the Association shall not carry out any other activities not permitted to be carried out by an organization exempt from Federal Income Tax under section 501(C)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code."

Membership: "Section 1: Members shall consist of those individuals qualified by background, education and interest in veterinary parasitology. Section 2: New members, except honorary and emeritus, shall be admitted by the Secretary-Treasurer with approval of the Executive Committee, after filing application for membership to the association. Section 3: Honorary membership shall be awarded by the Association to persons who are not members of the Association in recognition of outstanding and sustained achievements in veterinary parasitology. Candidates for honorary membership shall be recommended to the awards committee by any member. Nomination for honorary membership shall be made by the Awards Committee to the membership and election shall be majority vote at the annual meeting. Honorary members shall not be eligible to vote and shall not be assessed dues. No more than two (2) honorary members shall be elected in any one year period. Section 4: Upon retirement a member may become an emeritus member on approval of the Executive Committee of a written request to the Secretary-Treasurer for such status. Emeritus members shall retain voting rights but shall not be assessed dues. Section 5: Forfeiture of membership will occur where dues are not paid for at least two consecutive years. A member who has forfeited membership by nonpayment of dues must reapply for membership. Section 6: Expulsion of a member may occur if a motion for expulsion is presented by the Executive Committee at the annual meeting and passed by four-fifths (4/5) of the members present and voting. The member is to be informed in writing of such a motion at least two months in advance of the annual meeting at which the motion is to be presented. Section 7: The Executive Committee may annually invite any firm, association, corporation, institution or subdivision thereof, to become a corporate associate member, for financial support of the Association."
